About LACTLD

- LACTLD brings together the ccTLDs of Latin America and the Caribbean with the aim of promoting the exchange of experiences, fostering collaboration, and enhancing DNS security and stability in the LAC region.
- LACTLD members coordinate their activities by participating in our Working Groups and also by developing collaborative projects. Two of our key projects are the LACTLD Anycast Cloud and the Unified Domain Search Engine.

LACTLD's Illegal Content Workshop

- Since 2019, the Illegal Content Workshop has brought together judges, prosecutors and law enforcement officers to discuss the operation of the Internet and the DNS based on a technical-legal perspective.
- 5 Editions
 - 3 In-person editions (Bogotá, Cancún, Santiago de Chile)
 - 2 Virtual editions
- The Workshop has gathered 148 on-site participants and 356 virtual participants, representing a total of 27 countries.
- At present, the Illegal Content Workshop is being planned as a regional Technical Community initiative, led by LACTLD.



LACTLD's Illegal Content Workshop

- Raise awareness on the stability, resilience and security of core Internet services.
- Promote dialogue, capacity building and cooperation models between technical operators and judges, prosecutors and law enforcement officers.
- Strengthen participants' technical knowledge.
- Consolidate the role of LACTLD as a relevant actor in its regional ecosystem and in the countries where the in-person editions have been held.
- Promote joint efforts with the organizations of the LAC Technical Community.

Coordination with the LAC Technical Community

- Over the past two years, the Technical Community organizations have participated in regional events with different types of state and/or governmental stakeholders: regulators, policy makers, ministerial authorities, etc.
- The forums for dialogue between technical operators and state and governmental authorities are progressively increasing.
- Prioritization and allocation of resources.
- Coordination with the organizations of the regional Technical Community (LACNIC, LACNOG, LAC-IX, RedClara, the regional offices of ICANN and the Internet Society) has been very positive and has enabled a more efficient and streamlined participation.
